Job Title and Responsibilities:	<p>Coordinator, Centre for Excellence in Teaching and Learning</p> <p>The CETL is the faculty development programme for the entire faculty of Daystar University, regardless of what division they work in, or their status as part or full time. The head of the Centre reports directly to the Deputy Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs. She or he works on a peer level with the deans. The head of the Centre is responsible for the development, implementation, and evaluation of all faculty development programmes in the University. It is the other deans who have the deepest understanding of the professional and developmental needs of their respective faculty members. In order for the head of the Centre to effectively do her or his job he or she will need to work on a close and regular basis with them. The head of the Centre should serve on the Dean's committee and participate fully in the academic affairs under its jurisdiction.</p>
4. Biography (About Me):	<p>I was born in 1956 in Washington DC, USA. I grew up in Rockville, Maryland, attending public schools in the area. I graduated from Richard Montgomery High School in 1974. I earned a BA from William Jewell College, Liberty, MO, graduating <i>magna cum laude</i> in 1979. I also graduated from Full Faith Church of Love Bible College, Shawnee, KS, with a diploma in Bible, the same year.</p> <p>I committed my life to follow Christ when I was a very young boy. I received my calling to missions in Africa at the age of 9 while attending my home church's missions conference. In 1980, I was appointed a missionary with <i>Elim Fellowship</i>, Lima, NY, and stationed in Nyeri, Kenya. From 1980 until 1988, I conducted a <i>Theological Education by Extension</i> programme for the <i>Pentecostal Evangelistic Fellowship of Africa</i>, an indigenous denomination in Kenya. In January 1984, I was ordained to the ministry by Full Faith Church of Love, Shawnee, KS.</p> <p>From 1988 to 1989, I attended Wheaton College Graduate School, Wheaton, IL, graduating in 1989 with an MA in Intercultural Studies. I returned to Kenya the same year. From 1989 to 1993, I became increasingly involved in the training of teachers for programs of ministry formation in East Africa. Interested in engaging in this on a full-time basis, I returned to the United States in 1993 to pursue a doctoral program in Adult Education at Florida State University. After completing the course work at FSU, I returned to Kenya in 1997 where I joined the faculty of Daystar University. I was appointed the coordinator of the <i>Outpost Training</i> programme, the extension education arm of Daystar. It was while working in this capacity that I conducted the research that formed the basis of my dissertation. In January 2001, I was appointed to direct the <i>Centre for Excellence in Teaching and Learning</i>, the faculty development programme of the University. I continue to serve as missionary faculty for the university. I was awarded a PhD in Adult Education from FSU in the fall semester of 2002.</p> <p>In 2014, I helped establish the <i>Association for Faculty Enrichment in Learning and Teaching</i> (AFELT). This organization serves the East African region as a professional association for academic staff and other major players in higher education. I serve as its chair.</p> <p>In 1976, I married Chari Rae. We have three adult children, Joshua, Samuel, and Amanda.</p>
